Mental Health and Well-Being Week



Last week, students and staff engaged in activities about friendships, conflict resolution and social skills. These topics were chosen because of a deficit in the student Be You survey results from Term 4 last year, so it was necessary to develop the students' skills in these

areas.

Some activities included friendship soup, a whole school friendship tree, reading and discussing books about flexible thinking and how to retain friendships.

Our Health Specialist engaged students in conflict resolution and social skills games. These were integral to class discussions on resolving conflict particularly in the playground.

The Year Fives learnt more about the risks of rumours and how spreading them can cause conflict and harm to others.

Linda Bancroft from Wellbeing 4 Kids visited and provided everyone with fun yoga and mindfulness to help students to learn how to calm their body and mind for optimum learning to take place. Please take the time

to talk with your children to reinforce good friendship characteristics and how to resolve conflict without being physical. We talk out the incident at school to determine what were the red or green choices and it is helpful to use the following terms;

- <u>Rude</u>—when someone says or does something unintentionally hurtful and they do it once.
- Mean—when someone says or does something intentionally hurtful and they do it once.
- <u>Bullying</u>—when someone says or does something intentionally hurtful and **they keep doing it**, even when they are told to stop. This creates an imbalance of power and needs * Room 4's

Bebras Computational Challenge Round 1:

Bebras is an international initiative aiming to promote Computer Science among school students at all ages. The Bebras challenge is engages students' computational thinking and problem solving skills in a fun, interactive environment.

Each challenge has 15 questions with the highest possible score being 135 points. The level of difficulty of a question determines how it will be scored. Easy questions are worth 6 points, medium questions are worth 9 points, and hard questions are worth 12 points. Any incorrect or unanswered questions are awarded zero points.

The Bebras achievement level breakdown is as follows:

- Participation 0-59 points
- Merit 60-86 points
- Credit 87-101 points
- Distinction 102-113 points
- High Distinction 114-134 points
